## What Is Adderall?

Adderall is the brand name of a prescription medication used to treat attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD) in children and adults.

### Common side effects of Adderall include:

- \* Nervousness
- \* Dizziness
- \* Restlessness
- \* Headache
- \* Stomachache
- \* Decreased appetite
- \* Trouble sleeping
- \* Dry mouth
- \* Nausea
- \* Weight loss
- \* Constipation or diarrhea

### Long-term abuse or abuse that involves high doses of Adderall include:

- \* Changes in vision
- \* Seizures
- \* Chest pain
- \* Trouble breathing
- \* Fainting
- \* Severe weakness or numbness in arms or legs
- \* Uncontrolled movements or voice sounds
- \* Hallucinations or delusions
- \* Aggressive behavior
- \* Uncontrollable behavior
- \* Severe skin rash
- \* Swelling of face, lips, or tongue
- \* Difficulty swallowing or talking
- \* Irregular heartbeat

## STRENGTHS OF ADDERALL

### Effects of Adderall Abuse

Adderall abuse can lead to more serious side effects. When the drug is not taken as directed, problems can occur such as:

**Tolerance**—is needing more of the drug to obtain the same high. As use increases, it becomes impossible to ever recreate that first initial high.

**Dependency**—your body does not function the same without the drug.

**Addiction**—a consistent seeking out the medication despite knowing the risks and consequences.

People are more likely to overdose and cause harm to their bodies when the drug is misused. A major concern for many people that abuse Adderall over an extended period is the risk of cardiovascular issues. Since Adderall is a stimulant, it plays a major role in:

- \* Increasing your blood pressure.
- \* Increasing your heart rate.
- \* Increasing your body temperature to dangerous levels.

When abusing Adderall with other substances like alcohol, Adderall has the ability to mask certain indicators of intoxication. If these signs go unnoticed, the user is at risk of continued drinking, potentially leading to alcohol poisoning, coma, and even death.
